MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



In early October, 14 district governors met in Louisville, Kentucky, U.S., to learn about the seven steps to new club building. (While I was there, I learned to pronounce our host city as "Lew-a-vul.")

The result: Three new U.S. Kiwanis clubs — one each in Owen County, Kentucky; Oldham County, Kentucky; and Jefferson County, Indiana — and more than 60 charter members. More importantly, these governors worked with the Kentucky-Tennessee and Indiana Districts' membership teams to enhance their club-building skills while enjoying the camaraderie and synergy of learning together. This collaborative effort boosted their confidence and led to the successful launch of new clubs.

Led by Past Kiwanis International President Jim Rochford, who is chairman of the International Committee on New Club Building, the participants learned firsthand about making appointments and meeting prospects — and how three months of advance planning can play a critical role in the successful opening of new clubs.

Building new clubs is the first and foremost pillar of our Build. Nurture. Retain. global membership initiative. This year we will roll out more programs, events and resources for each of the initiative's pillars to strengthen our organization so we can multiply our positive impact on children.

The 7 steps to new club building

- 1. Assemble club opening team.
- 2. Conduct site survey and site selection.
- 3. Create a list of prospective members.
- 4. Make appointments.
- 5. Meet and recruit new members.
- 6. Conduct organization meeting.

7. Mentor the new club for two years (incorporating the Nurture and Retain pillars of our global initiative).

- Rebuilding existing clubs with a strong history in the community but with few remaining active members.
- Developing stronger district membership teams.
